
WHO ARE THE HOLOCAUST RESCUERS

- Rescuers are individuals or groups who helped Jewish people escape the Nazis during World War Two.
- Rescuers would hide Jewish people in their homes and deny their whereabouts to Nazi prosecutors, if found guilty of hiding or aiding Jews it was punishable by imprisonment in a concentration camp or death to both the rescuer and the Jewish people
- Rescuers would also sometimes help Jewish people get new ID papers to help them escape the country as often their papers stated their religion


We were very lucky to be able to arrange a visit from a Holocaust Survivor for \$4 pupils who found the experience very engaging.

Advanced Higher Geographers have completed urban and river fieldwork.






