

Q: What is demi girl/boy?

A. Feeling demigender e.g. demigirl or demiboy means you feel a partial but not full connection to that gender identity. These identities are both part of the nonbinary umbrella which includes people whose gender identity does not fall under the accepted gender binary of male and female.



Q: What if I don't know what my sexuality or gender identity is?

A. There are so many terms and labels now for people who express their sexuality and gender in different ways that it can be easy to fall into the trap of feeling like you have to label yourself. Sexuality and gender identity are not fixed- they grow and develop as you and your personality does. We aren't the same as we were when we were 6 - and thank goodness for that! So don't worry if you don't know. There's no need to put yourself into a box.

<u>Day 3</u>



Edinburgh's Role in the

Slavery Era

The time of slavery was a very unhappy time for everyone who was affected by it. Families were torn apart, people were worked and worked and worked, getting nothing in return, not even life itself. Yes, they survived... for an average of four years after being introduced to slavery, but from that point forward, they weren't living. There was no quality of life. The only thing that kept some of them going was the hope that one day, they could be reunited by their long-lost relatives. However, as each day grew more and more difficult, the ability to retain that hope became inevitably less and less possible to achieve. Although they persevered and tried their absolute best, they were fighting a losing battle. The living conditions – or might I say, the surviving conditions – were horrendous. Can you imagine sleeping, crammed in with lots of individuals all in the same boat as you, chained up, on the concrete, wearing the same clothes you were in when you were snatched. The list goes on about these torturous conditions. The point is that you can't imagine it. You may be able to try to guess what it was like, but whatever you are thinking the worst that could happen is, the reality was ten times more horrible. It's impossible for people like us who have live in the 21st century to actually understand and appreciate what actually happened but we can make sure such atrocities never happens again by spreading awareness about it. Some of the people who were behind all of this were, in fact from Edinburgh. They played a large role in how Edinburgh is today, economy and appearance wise.

The towering statue of Henry Dundas, 1st Viscount Melville, stands proudly in St. Andrew Square. As you look at it, you'll notice buildings that were once owned by Scots who amassed wealth through the transatlantic slave trade. Dundas, with his immense power, used his influence to delay the abolition of the slave trade until 1807. While chattel slavery was abolished in most British colonies in 1834, it came at a cost and the formerly enslaved were subjected to an unpaid apprenticeship program. On the 19th of September 2023, the update was announced that the plaque was removed after a campaign of relatives of Dundas. They said that he was "instrumental in deferring the abolition of the Atlantic slave trade". Sir Geoff Palmer claimed that the writing on the plaque was "inappropriate and does not provide a factual description" which made the Black Lives Matter movement decide to remove it.




Dundas House, the magnificent headquarters of the Royal Bank of Scotland, was once the residence of Lawrence Dundas, cousin of Henry Dundas. Lawrence Dundas owned plantations in Grenada and Dominica. The bronze statue outside the bank immortalises the 4th Earl of Hopetoun, brother of Henry Dundas' second wife and vice governor of the bank. He played a role in ending the twoyear slave revolution led by Julien Fedon in Grenada. The suppression of this revolution prolonged slavery in Grenada for nearly 40 years.

Frederick Douglas was, born into slavery in Maryland in 1818 and escaped to New York in 1838. He became a powerful speaker and fought for freedom alongside his family. During his visit to Edinburgh in 1846 - 7, he gave a famous speech at the Assembly Rooms, sharing the story of Madison Washington, an enslaved man fighting for freedom. Douglas also pressured the Free Church to return funds raised from slave states. He lived at 33 Gilmore Place and his efforts raised awareness for the abolitionist cause.

Bute House, the official residence of the First Minister of Scotland, has historical ties to the slave trade. It was one of the grand houses in Charlotte Square and was once home to John Innes Crawford, who inherited his father's plantation and enslaved people in Jamaica. Sir John Sinclair of Ulster also resided there and claimed compensation for enslaved people on his estates in St. Vincent. Charles Oman, who later owned the property, had connections to Jamaica as well.

In 1740, there was a servant named Oronoce who lived in the Writer's Museum with Lady Stair. African men and women also held high positions at the Scottish Royal Court in the 16th century before racial slavery created the concept of 'race'. From the late 17th to early 19th century, many people of African or Indian descent lived in Edinburgh, often serving as 'exotic' servants for the wealthy. Jock's Lodge was a gathering place for African/Caribbean people, and there are records of an African man being baptised in the Canongate in the 1680s. Malvina Wells, who was born enslaved, worked as a 'lady's maid' in Edinburgh. Even though the Tumbling Lassie case in 1687 declared slavery illegal in Scotland, it was still considered legal on Scottish soil. Advertisements appeared in newspapers for the sale of enslaved people and rewards for capturing runaway slaves. An advert from the Edinburgh Evening Courant on February 13, 1727, described a runaway named Ann, a 18year-old black woman, wearing a green gown and a brass collar engraved with "Gustavus Brown in Dalkieth his Negro, 1726." The reward for apprehending her was two guineas and necessary charges.






Three significant cases were heard at the Court of Session involving runaway slaves seeking freedom. Montgomery v Sheddan (1756), Spens v Dalrymple (1768), and Knight v. Wedderburn (1778). James Montgomery, also known as 'Shanker,' escaped to Edinburgh but unfortunately passed away before his case was decided. David Spens, known as 'Black Tom,' sued his 'owner' Dr. David Dalrymple for wrongful arrest and became free when Dalrymple died. Joseph Knight, influenced by the Somerset v. Stewart case, successfully argued against the status of slavery in Scotland.

In 1780, Charles Edmonstone, a Scotsman, traveled to Demerara (Guyana) and married Helen Reid, also known as Princess Minda. It was common for Amerindians and African people to work together and have families. Charles utilised his forest tracking skills learned from his Amerindian heritage to search for runaway slaves. In 1817, Charles brought his family back to Scotland, but their marriage faced challenges when Minda/Helen refused to free one of Charles' favoured female slaves. The specifics of their relationship and the issue it caused are

uncertain. Minda/Helen later struggled with opium addiction and lived in seclusion. John Edmonstone, an enslaved man from Guyana, joined Charles in Scotland in 1817. He taught taxidermy at Edinburgh University and even taught Charles Darwin. Darwin learned about South American flora and fauna from Edmonstone, which influenced his Theory of Evolution. While their friendship was positive, Darwin's later work propagated racist beliefs. A plaque honouring Edmonstone was created in 2009 in the style of anti-slavery porcelain brooches and placed at Boteco do Brasil.

In conclusion, the history of slavery in Scotland is a complex and often overlooked aspect of the country's past. The story of John Edmonstone highlights the contributions of enslaved individuals and their influence on scientific and intellectual development. While his friendship with Charles Darwin was positive, it is important to acknowledge that even influential figures like Darwin propagated racist beliefs in their later work. The commemorative plaque glorifying Edmonstone serves as a reminder of the need to confront and learn from the dark chapters of history.

TOP TEN THINGS TO DO IN EDINBURGH THIS AUTUMN By Top-Ten Seasonal Recommendations



Wondering what to do this spooky season? We've ranked the top ten things to do in the city centre this autumn. From ghost hunting in the old town to sipping soup in Greyfriars Kirk yard this list has all you need to make the most of this autumn in Edinburgh.



10. National Museum of Scotland

The national museum of Scotland has thousands of collections from historic Scotland to ancient Egypt. As well as famous fashion pieces from designers such as Vivienne Westwood, Alexander McQueen and Zandra Rhodes. The museum is also home to the first cloned animal Dolly the sheep.



Admission is free, making it a great place to spend time away from the autumn weather. The current expedition is Beyond the Black Dress, on display until the 29th of October, under 16s go free.

9. Dean Village

The dean village is one of Scotland's oldest villages and was originally used for water mills. It was built in 1200s and the mills were active up until the late nineteenth century, the remains of the mills can still be seen between the buildings.





Now the village has many cafes and shops to visit, as well as the modern art gallery being a short walk away which has free entry for the public.

8. The Marshmallow Lady

The marshmallow lady is the world's best marshmallow shop since 2010. It is a café that sells hundreds of different flavours of marshmallows every year and hot chocolate. Each day there is five different marshmallows flavours which can be added to a hot chocolate.



A marshmallow and hot chocolate drink costs £6 and they also sell donuts, coffee as well as milkshakes. There is seating inside making it a great place to meet friends for an afternoon snack. They also offer free marshmallow tasters and the owner's dog Pepe can be seen around the café.

7. Botanic Gardens

The Royal Botanic Gardens are 72 acres of land filled with over 10,000 plants, and several glass houses. The gardens were founded in 1640 and they are the best place to see the changing leaves of the season.



Admission to the gardens is free but access to the greenhouse costs £4, under 16s go free.

6. Armstrong & Son Vintage Clothing Emporium

Established in 1840 Armstrong & son vintage sells quality second-hand vintage clothes from the 1960s to the early 2000s. Located on the Grassmarket, Teviot Place, Clerk Street, and on Cockburn Street.







The Grassmarket shop features many vintage items such as signs, statues and even an Egyptian mummy case. Images taken in the Grassmarket shop.

5. National Gallery of Scotland and Portrait Gallery

The Portrait Gallery is located on Queen Street, and it features many portraits of Scots by various artists. Opened in 1889 the Gallery is free to enter and is a great place to spend an afternoon. Images on the left taken in the portrait gallery.



The National Gallery of Scotland is located on the mound, the gallery holds Scotland's national collection of art containing Scottish and international art from the beginning of the renaissance to the start of the 20th century. Images on the right are taken in National Gallery with its iconic red walls.

4. Union of Genius

Union of genius is a soup café where the menu changes daily. The menu consists of 6 soup choices and 2 choices of salad.





They have over 100 recipes for soups and baking which many are gluten free and also offer vegan options.

3. Pumpkin spice at Starbucks on Princes Street for views of the castle


What's more autumnal than a pumpkin spice latte? Starbucks on Princes Street has some of the best views of the castle making it a great place to meet friends or study as Wi-Fi is free.



This year's autumn menu features the classic pumpkin spice in latte, Frappuccino, cold brew and iced latte. The autumn menu also includes salted maple & caramel in cold brew and iced latte as well as seasonal flavoured baking.

2. Armchair Books

Armchair books is a family run second-hand book shop located on West Port. The books are organized alphabetically and the further in the book shop you go the older the books become with the oldest books from the 18th century.







The shop itself is a labyrinth with narrow corridors so it may be hard to move around when busy making not as accessible to people with mobility conditions, but the shop is able to accommodate if you send them an email.

1.Ghost Bus tour

The Ghost bus tour is comedy-horror tour. The bus explores the city's horrific history as well as some ghost stories along the way. The haunting history of Edinburgh's old town and the possibility of encounter a ghost makes the bus tour the perfect Halloween activity for this spooky season.



The tour last 1 hour and 15 minutes, tours start at 6, 7:30 and 9. Tickets cost £15 for under 15s and adult cost £21.

Halloween originated around 2000 years ago, when Celtic people in Europe celebrated the end of harvest and the start of a new year in a festival called Samhain.

The festival also signalled the beginning of winter which the Celts associated with death.

During Samhain lots of sacrifices were made. Crops and animals were burned in bonfires so people would be protected from evil. Offerings were also left out for mischievous spirits that had come to visit.

In the 1700s and 1800s, unmarried women performed rituals on Halloween in hopes of finding a husband. The women looking for husbands used to throw apple peels over their shoulders in hopes of seeing their future husband's initials in the shapes the peels made when they fell. The women also participated in competitions of apple bobbing; they thought whoever won would be married first.

When religion changed in Old England and Ireland the people continued to associate the end of October with the dead coming back. They set out gifts and food to please hungry spirits and, as the tradition got older, people started dressing in creepy costumes to go out and beg for treats. They called this "mumming" and it was very similar to the trick-or-treating we do today.

trick or treating became extremely popular by 1950, which was when Halloween became a national event. Over 179 million Americans celebrate the holiday and spend over \$9.1 billion each year on the event. Lots of people spend their money on costumes, decorations and sweets.

Hello and welcome back to another food review, the only reviews around that are totally honest, and share an unnecessary amount of detail, to help you find your new favourite food spot.

We had the pleasure of visiting Buck's Bar located on Grindley Street in Edinburgh. This was one of the best bucking restaurants we have been to. There is something for absolutely anyone at this place (assuming you like chicken, which you probably do) and their way of perfecting the golden brown chicken burger is one to admire. They have a large menu of various dishes, including chicken and waffles, the buck mac burger, and Nashville hot chicken tenders (which we will be reviewing). As well as the 10/10 food options, the atmosphere of the place is also top notch, with walls covered in bands and singers, and banging playlists - it's a new favourite destination of ours.

Chicken and waffles:

If you're a fan of the sweeter stuff in life, then this is the dish for you. With this dish you will get a massive amount of chicken that is cooked to perfection, the chicken is placed on top of a perfectly cooked waffle that is light and fluffy. With this meal you get the option to add maple syrup or gravy, personally I chose neither as kept it plain (which is the best way in my opinion) but its really up to you and how you like things. All in all I would 100% order this again and there is no way you can go through life without it.

The buck mac:

They don't make bread big enough to fit the extraordinary amount of chicken that was stuffed into this burger (obviously not complaining). As well as the crispy iceberg lettuce, cheese, and Buc Mac sauce, the restaurant's classic did not disappoint. Clearly plates are overrated, so the burger came in a large tray, with more skinny fries than ever recorded. The dish was more than enough, so pro tip, come in with an appetite. Overall, would definitely order again, you can't go wrong with the Buck Mac.

Nashville hot style chicken:

this was a dish containing 3 larger than average succulent chicken tenders soaked in a spicy Nashville inspired sauce on a piece of soft white bread, topped with 2.5 (thick) crinkled cut pickles. This dish was bold, I went for the hot (mildest of the 3) and it was spicy- perfect for anyone with a big ego. The pickles added a much-needed tangy element but didn't take away from the dish, and the bread was nice as it soaked up the sauce. You should order this if you like a challenge, but if not, go home. I couldn't really see much through my watery eyes, but I would say the restaurant looks quite nice. I would like to add an honourable mention to the salt and chili chips, this meal was a continental excursion that you can only get in Edinburgh!

Stop TIPS FOR PUMPKI CARVING
